## Data Sources Drawn Upon In Our Work This Summer

- <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Center for Injury Prevention and Control. Web-based Injury Statistics Query and Reporting System (WISQARS)</u>
  - The WISQARS database was our primary resource in tabulating trends and disparities for total deaths and firearm-related deaths at the country and statelevels. The CDC gathers this information from their National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) mortality data files.
- RAND State-Level Estimates of Household Firearm Ownership
  - A database comprised of state-level estimates of household firearm ownership each year from 1980 to 2016.
